#### THE HISTORY OF THE CHATHAM Community Church

The history of the Chatham Community Church began in England with King Henry VIII, in 1538. Thanks to the long hours of study and research by the Chatham Historical Society members and Chatham Community Church members, this history has been recorded in documents and placed for safe keeping at the Chatham Historical Society.

The roots of some existing families in Chatham have been traced back to that time. For this first piece of history, I am citing information from "One Hundred and Fifty Years and More of the Chatham Congregational Church", written by Phyllis Grim Siman, Church Historian, in 1999. Each church newsletter will have additional historical information. If any of our readers or community members have historical data to share, please do share this before this information is lost forever.

"England's King Henry VIII, through the Act of Supremacy of 1538, persuaded his Parliament to vote him Supreme Lord of the Church of England. He asserted that his country, England, was to be a self-governing nation, free from the interference of the Kings of Europe and the Pope in Rome. He started a religious revolution which ousted the Pope as head of the church and placed himself, as King, in the Pope's place. Thus began a long and bloody siege between the ruling power and the Roman Catholic leaders, with their great wealth of monasteries, cathedrals, and land.

The ten year old son of Henry VIII and Jane Seymour became King, as Edward VI, after the death of his father. He was manipulated by unscrupulous advisors who did everything they could to make Protestantism, as the new church was known, hateful to the people.

Mary Tudor, Edward's older sister, came to the throne in 1553. Mary's goal was to restore Roman Catholicism. She persecuted the Protestants and exterminated many reformers.

Elizabeth, daughter of Henry VIII and Ann Bolyn, drove her half-sister, "Bloody Mary", as she was called, from the throne, and Protestantism again returned to the land. The Duke of Norfolk reminded her, 'Let your Highness assure yourself that England can bear no more changes in religion, it hath bowed so often that if it should be bent again it should break.' Queen Elizabeth ordered Mary Stuart, then the Queen of the Scots, beheaded for treason. Elizabeth's secretaries, Walshingham and Davison, delivered the warrant."
